Regular Council Meeting

September 5, 2018

The Wakefield City Council met in a regular meeting on September 5, 2018, in the Council Chambers at 407 Main Street at 5:30 P.M. with the following present: Mayor Loofe, Council Members Eaton, Clay, Soderberg, and Hansen. Also present: City Administrator Litchfield, City Attorney Miner, Utility Foreman Mogus, Administrative Coordinator Decker, and Clerk Dolen.

Mayor Loofe opened the meeting at 5:30 P.M.

Mayor Loofe noted that the meeting was preceded by due and legal notice in three places at least 72 hours prior to the meeting and by publishing the same in the Wakefield Republican on August 30, 2018.

Mayor Loofe informed those present of the Nebraska Open Meetings Law, and where a copy of such was posted in the Council Chambers for review.

Mayor Loofe opened the public hearing for the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 Budget at 5:31 P.M.

Mike Pommer addressed the council on the proposed 2018-2019 Fiscal Year. He said total tax asking for 2018 – 2019 would be \$384,500.00, which would keep the mill levy at \$.50. He pointed out where the changes that the council had made at the special council meeting on August 30, 2018 were located at within the budget.

With nobody else wishing to speak for or against the proposed 2018-2019 Fiscal Year Budget, Councilman Hansen moved to close the public hearing. Councilman Clay seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Hansen, Eaton, Clay, Soderberg. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried, public hearing closed at 5:42 P.M.

Councilman Hansen then moved to amend the minutes from the August 8, 2018 regular council meeting to change the Michener Street Grant application showing the application to reflect the replacing of four blocks instead of five. Soderberg seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Eaton, Clay, Soderberg, Hansen. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Councilman Eaton moved to approve the minutes from the August 8, 2018 meeting as amended. Councilman Clay seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Clay, Soderberg, Hansen, Eaton. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Councilman Eaton moved to approve the August 2018 Treasurer's Report. Councilman Hansen seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Soderberg, Hansen, Eaton, Clay. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Councilman Eaton moved to amend the budget as previously published in the Park Fund, Fire Fund, and Street Fund. Councilman Clay seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Hansen, Eaton, Clay, Soderberg. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Councilman Eaton then moved to approve the 2018-2019 Fiscal Year Budget. Councilman Hansen seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Eaton, Clay, Soderberg, Hansen. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Councilman Eaton then introduced Resolution 13-2018 setting the final tax asking for Fiscal Year 2018-2019 at \$384,500.00, and moved for it final passage. Councilman Soderberg seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Clay, Soderberg, Hansen, Eaton. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Rod Hanson then addressed the council on the Civic Center Project. He said the new completion date is set for the end of September. Councilman Clay moved to approve Pay Request #11 for \$151,533.90 to Global Engineering. Councilman Hansen seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Soderberg, Hansen, Eaton, Clay. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Hanson then addressed the council on the Storm and Sidewalk Project. He said all that remained on the project was the flashing beacon on 7th Street crossing Highway 35. Councilman Hansen moved to approve Pay Request #2 for \$23,168.48 to Mark Albeneisus Inc. Councilman Clay seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Hansen, Eaton, Clay, Soderberg. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Heather Jordan then addressed the council on behalf of the Wakefield Care Center. They will be holding a fundraiser on October 27, 2018 from 11:00 A.M. to 3:00 P.M., and would like to close off Walnut Street from 3rd Street to 4th Street. Councilman Eaton moved to approve blocking off Walnut Street between 3rd and 4th Street on October 27, 2018 from 10:00 AM to 4:00 P.M. Councilman Clay seconded the motin. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Eaton, Clay, Soderberg, Hansen. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

AJ Johnson then went before the council on behalf of Sidelines Bar and Grille to request approval for a Special Designated Liquor License. Sidelines would like to operate the license on September 22, 2018 from 2:00 P.M. to 1:00 A.M. in conjunction with the BBQ Bash King of the Wings contest. Councilman Clay moved to approve the Special Designated License application for Sidelines Bar and Grille. Councilman Eaton seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Clay, Soderberg, Hansen, Eaton. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Jim Stout then addressed the council on behalf of the Wakefield Heritage Organization. Stout requested the abandonment of City right of way on First Street across from the Depot in order to grind some of the curb along First Street for additional public parking. Councilman Eaton moved to approve the cutting of the curb on the South side of First Street for 72 feet, more or less, pursuant to the WHO obtaining a permit from the City. Councilman Hansen seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Soderberg, Hansen, Eaton, Clay. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Councilman Eaton then introduced Resolution #14-2018 to approve the purchase agreement for Gustafson Estates 2nd Addition, Lot # 2 to Brian Miller, and moved for its final passage. Councilman Hansen seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Hansen, Eaton, Clay, Soderberg. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Councilman Soderberg then moved to approve Building Permit # 25-2018 for the new construction of a single family home on Gustafson Estates 2nd Addition, Lot #2. Councilman Clay seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Eaton, Clay, Soderberg, Hansen. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Councilman Soderberg then introduced Resolution #15-2018 to approve the purchase agreement for Gustafson Estates 2nd Addition, Lot # 5 to Jeff Keagle, and moved for its final passage. Councilman Hansen seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Clay, Soderberg, Hansen, Eaton. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Approval of a purchase agreement for Lot # 9 was tabled.

Mayor Loofe then read aloud Ordinance #5-2018 confirming the sale of Gustafson Estates 2nd Addition, Lot #4.

Councilman Eaton introduced Ordinance # 5-2018 and moved to waive the three readings. Councilman Clay seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Soderberg, Hansen, Eaton, Clay. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Councilman Clay then moved for the final passage of Ordinance #5-2018 confirming the sale of Gustafson Estates 2nd Addition, Lot #4 to Matt Brenn and Emma Kubik. Councilman Hansen seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Hansen, Eaton, Clay, Soderberg. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Mayor Loofe then read aloud Ordinance #6-2018 confirming the sale of Lot 1, Block 31 of the West Addition.

Councilman Eaton introduced #6-2018 to confirm the sale of Lot 1, Block 31 of the West Addition and moved to waive the three readings. Councilman Hansen seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Eaton, Clay, Hansen, Soderberg. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Councilman Hansen then moved for final passage of Ordinance # 6-2018 confirming the sale of Lot 1, Block 31 of the West Addition to Sebade Construction. Councilman Clay seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Clay, Soderberg, Hansen, Eaton. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Mayor Loofe then read aloud Ordinance #7-2018 confirming the sale of Lots 2 & 3 of the Rose Addition.

Councilman Soderberg introduced Ordinance # 7-2018 and moved to waive the three readings. Councilman Eaton seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Soderberg, Hansen, Eaton, Clay. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

Councilman Eaton then moved for final passage of Ordinance #7-2018 confirming the sale of Lots 2 & 3 of the Rose Addition to Eric and Traci Riewer. Councilman Clay seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Hansen, Eaton, Clay, Soderberg. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried.

A request to open the alley south of Oak Street Market was tabled.

Megan Weaver then updated the council on the Rural Workforce Housing Program. She stated that several loans have been approved totaling over a half a million dollars to date, and that she expects the State to release their funds shortly.

The council then briefly discussed lot prices for the South Main.

Mayor Loofe then opened the Public Hearing regarding a potentially dangerous dog at 6:32 P.M.

Attorney Miner handed the elected officials copies of the dangerous dog City ordinance and read aloud for everyone present. He explained that the incident in question took place was filed with the Dixon County Sheriff's office on July 9, 2018, and that Administrator Litchfield mailed the dog owner certified notice of a potentially dangerous dog on August 15, 2018. Kay Hilsinger then came before the council to protest that her dog was potentially dangerous.

Kevin Peters spoke before the council in favor of the dog.

Joe Brown spoke before the council against the dog.

Zach Dolen spoke before the council against the dog.

Attorney Miner advised the council they had 15 days to reach a decision as to whether or not to rule Hilsinger's dog as potentially dangerous. With nobody else wishing to speak for or against the potentially dangerous dog, Councilman Eaton moved to close the public hearing. Councilman Clay seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Hansen, Eaton, Clay, Soderberg. The following voted nay: None. Motion carried, public hearing closed at 7:31 P.M.

Councilman Eaton then moved to approve the request for Drawdown #7 for NAHTF grant # 15-TFHP-35028 for \$1,798.96. Councilman Hansen seconded the motion. On a roll call vote, the following voted aye: Clay, Soderberg, Hansen, Eaton. The following voted nay: None.

The council then again discussed lot prices
